

"Look Up!"



ne ministry of music this morning is offered by the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church Cho Dr. Ryan Jackson, *William S. Perper Director of Music and Fine Arts Ministries* Dr. Patrick Kreeger, *Associate Organist* • Rachel Mikol, *soprano* Mendelssohn Trio: Wilson Nichols, Alex McCoy, and Max Parsons The choral and organ music this morning was chosen to mark of the feast of Epiphany, officially celebrated this past Friday, January 6, following the twelve days of Christmas. Epiphany is the time when Christians remember the Wise Men (also sometimes called the Three Kings) who visited Jesus in his childhood.

Both the Organ Prelude and the Communion Anthem feature one of the oldest and most famous Epiphany hymns, *Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern* ("How Brightly Shines the Morning Star"), composed by Philipp Nicolai in 1597. Buxtehude's variations on the tune are playful and colorful, allowing the organist to show off many lighter colors of the organ. Mendelssohn includes the entire first verse of the hymn toward the end of the Communion Anthem, *There Shall a Star Come Out of Jacob*, which is the opening chorus of his unfinished oratorio on the life of Jesus, *Christus*.
