



SCRIPTURE LESSON

Daniel 7:1-14

Austin Applebach, Director of Engagement

Voice 1: In the first year of King Belshazzar of Babylon, Daniel had a dream and visions of his head as he lay in bed. Then he wrote down the dream:

Voice 2: I, Daniel, saw in my vision by night the four winds of heaven stirring up the great sea, and four great beasts came up out of the sea, different from one another. The first was like a lion

and had eagles' wings. Then, as I watched, its wings were plucked off, and it was lifted up from the ground and made to stand on two feet like a human being; and a human mind was given to it.

All: Another beast appeared, a second one, that looked like a bear. It was raised up on one side, had three tusks in its mouth among its teeth and was told, 'Arise, devour many bodies!' After this, as I watched, another appeared, like a leopard. The beast had four wings of a bird on its back and four heads; and dominion was given to it.

Voice 1: After this I saw in the visions by night a fourth beast, terrifying and dreadful and exceedingly strong. It had great iron teeth and was devouring, breaking in pieces, and stamping what was left with its feet. It was different from all the beasts that preceded it, and it had ten horns.

Voice 2: I was considering the horns, when another horn appeared, a little one coming up among them; to make room for it, three of the earlier horns were plucked up by the roots. There were eyes like human eyes in this horn, and a mouth speaking arrogantly.

All: As I watched,

thrones were set in place,
and an Ancient One took his throne;
his clothing was white as snow,
and the hair of his head like pure wool;
his throne was fiery flames,
and its wheels were burning fire.
A stream of fire issued
and flowed out from his presence.
A thousand, thousand served him,
and ten thousand times ten thousand stood attending him.
The court sat in judgement,
and the books were opened.

Voice 1: I watched then because of the noise of the arrogant words that the horn was speaking. And as I watched, the beast was put to death, and its body destroyed and given over to be burned with fire.

Voice 2: As for the rest of the beasts, their dominion was taken away, but their lives were prolonged for a season and a time. As I watched in the night visions,

All: I saw one like a human being coming with the clouds of heaven.

And he came to the Ancient One and was presented before him.

To him was given dominion and glory and kingship, that all peoples, nations, and languages should serve him.

His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not pass away, and his kingship is one that shall never be destroyed.

One: This is the Word of God; for the People of God.

All: Thanks be to God.



WORSHIP NOTES

The Anthem, "In Beauty May I Walk," was composed by the brilliant British composer Jonathan Dove. The words come from an anonymous prayer of the Navajo people, translated by poet Jerome Rothenberg. This lovely musical setting is based on an evocative mantra-like theme that is sung repeatedly throughout much of the piece, primarily in the bass part. The repetition of this theme seems at once to plant the music firmly in the ground while lending it an air of weightlessness, as though suspended in time. In a contrasting middle section, the staccato sound of birdsong can be heard in the upper voices, ornamenting the words "beautifully, joyful." The original mantra-like theme returns, leading the piece to an awesome climax before ending gently in quiet wonder.

The Offertory Anthem, also by Jonathan Dove, is the Gloria from his *Missa Brevis* ("Short Mass"), a work commissioned by the Cathedral Organists' Association in the UK. *Missa Brevis* was premiered by the choir of Wells Cathedral in 2009, and was chosen for the BBC's Christmas Day Worship broadcast in 2009. Since that time, *Missa Brevis* has become one of the most popular contemporary settings of the Mass, and has been performed in countless services throughout the world. The Gloria is characteristic of Dove's distinctive minimalist style, featuring catchy rhythmic motives, ingenious thematic prolongation, and captivating interplay between the choir and organ.
