WORSHIP NOTES

Benjamin Britten's *Missa Brevis in D*, Op. 63, is a striking and inventive setting of the Mass, composed in 1959 for the treble choristers of Westminster Cathedral Choir and their director, George Malcolm. Scored for three vocal parts with a highly varied and colorful organ accompaniment, the work highlights the brilliance and versatility of upper voices. This morning, the spotlight is on the sopranos and altos of the Fifth Avenue Choir as they perform without the usual foundation of tenors and basses.

The Missa Brevis follows the traditional five-movement structure, with each section marked by distinctive musical character and rhythmic vitality. The Kyrie unfolds in ethereal, overlapping phrases, evoking mystery and introspection. The Gloria bursts forth with rhythmic energy, alternating between jubilant exclamations and moments of hushed reverence. In the Sanctus, bell-like organ chords support soaring vocal lines, leading to a triumphant Hosanna. The Benedictus is more intimate, with a lyrical, flowing melody. The Agnus Dei is perhaps the most haunting movement, its sighing phrases and unresolved harmonies leaving a sense of lingering tension. Some have even likened the insistent dissonances of the organ part to the sound of car horns in a bustling city. We hope you enjoy this kaleidoscopic masterpiece!

Outreach Ministries
